Native American Contributions

From the foods we eat to the games we play, the innovations and influences of Native Americans have shaped our everyday lives. November is National American Indian Heritage Month, a time to recognize the countless contributions of North America's native peoples.

Food. Nearly half of the crops grown in the world today were first cultivated by Native Americans, including corn, potatoes, pumpkins, squash, melons and peanuts.

Language. From "barbecue," "chipmunk" and "hammock" to the names of U.S. cities and states, numerous English words derived from native languages. During World War II, the Navajo language was used as a secret, unbreakable code by the U.S. Marine Corps.

Recreation. Canoes, kayaks, toboggans and snowshoes, often

used for leisure today, served as transportation for American Indians. Hockey, lacrosse and relay races also have roots in their culture.

Ecology. Native Americans have always respected the land they lived on and helped early European settlers survive by teaching them what crops to plant and to only hunt and fish for what was needed.

Government. Some historians say the foundation of America's democracy, with individual freedoms and power divided between federal and state governments, was partly based on the Iroquois League, a confederation of tribes that dates to the 17th century.



Beetle Bailey. This lazy but lovable private in the U.S. Army made his comic strip debut in 1950. Today, Beetle's regular run-ins with Sgt. Snorkel, along with other misadventures at Camp Swampy, are seen in 1,800 newspapers around the globe.

Quinton McHale. The 1960s sitcom "McHale's Navy" starred Ernest Borgnine as Lt. Cmdr. McHale, the leader of a U.S. Navy PT boat stationed in the South Pacific during World War II. Equipped with a familiarity with island life and fondness for his crew, McHale showed competence both in combat and when helping his men with their zany schemes.

Gomer Pyle. Although life on a U.S. Marine Corps base is a far cry from Mayberry, N.C., this gas station attendant-turned-military man remained the same sweet, simple-minded character seen on "The Andy Griffith Show." The success of "Gomer Pyle, U.S.M.C." prompted the Marines to make star Jim Nabors an honorary member of the branch in 2001.

Tony Nelson. As a U.S. Air Force pilot and astronaut, Capt. Nelson should be able to handle any situation—but encountering a magical, mischievous genie from a bottle is another story. Played by Larry Hagman, the "I Dream of Jeannie" leading man was later promoted to major, but would always be "Master" to Jeannie.

NOVEMBER

1800: President John Adams and his family move in to the newly completed White House, then called the President's House.

1906: SOS is adopted as the standard distress signal at sea.

1910: Hailed as a monumental work of architecture, the Pennsylvania Station railroad terminal opens in New York City.

1924: The Boston Bruins make their debut as the first U.S. team in the NHL.

1939: In Hyde Park, N.Y., the cornerstone is laid for a library to preserve President Franklin D. Roosevelt's official papers. It was America's first presidential library.

1945: The first issue of Ebony magazine is published.

1959: On Broadway, the Rodgers and Hammerstein musical "The Sound of Music" opens.

1968: The Motion Picture Association of America introduces a rating system for movies.

1973: Britain's Princess Anne marries Capt. Mark Phillips at Westminster Abbey.

1989: L. Douglas Wilder of Virginia becomes the first African-American governor elected in the U.S.

1993: Made up of 12 countries, the European Union is formally established.

2000: A crew of three arrives at the International Space Station and is the first to live and work at the research facility.

2008: Taylor Swift releases her second album, "Fearless." It would go on to be the most awarded album in country music history.

2013: Disney's animated movie musical "Frozen" premieres. Record box office ticket sales made it the highest-grossing animated film of all time.
