If you read the front page of the SF Chronicle, you would have read about a female humpback whale that had become entangled in a spider web of crab traps and lines. She was weighted down by hundreds of pounds of traps that caused her to struggle to stay afloat. She also had hundreds of yards of line rope wrapped around her body, her tail, her torso, and a line tugging in her mouth.

A fisherman spotted her just east of the Farallon Islands (outside the Golden Gate) and radioed an environmental group for help. Within a few hours, the rescue team arrived and determined that she was so bad off, the only way to save her was to dive in and untangle her.

They worked for hours with curved knives and eventually freed her. When she was free, the divers say she swam in what seemed like joyous circles. She then came back to each and every diver, one at a time, and nudged them, pushed gently and thanked them.

Some said it was the most incredible and beautiful experience of their life. The guy who cut the rope out of her mouth said her eye followed him the whole time, and he will never be the same.

May you, and all those you love, be so blessed and fortunate to be surrounded by people who will help you get untangled from the things that are binding you.

And, may you always know the joy of giving and receiving gratitude.

November's Featured Resident by Shirley Reimer



Unsurprisingly, Campus Commons resident Claire Quinlan's story ties neatly into the script of twentieth-century American history that we have come to know so well.

Hers is a typical American family story: Both sets of her grandparents arrived from Ireland, intent on making new lives in America, then worked hard to support themselves and their new families – resulting in so many of the positive endings that have contributed to America's growth.

Such common stories of nineteenth century immigration in America were never easy. Stories about the accomplishments of these immigrants to America are legion.

Yet, even with the struggles of survival that so many have learned of their immigrant backgrounds, Claire's family can record one early blessing in her early family background.

One of the first children born to her Irish maternal grandparents was a female child whose birth-weight was measured at an "impossible" one and one-half pounds!

At that time, well before the time of incubators, this infant girl was kept snuggled beside the kitchen stove to keep her warm week after week – and she survived! That miracle infant grew up to become Claire's mother, who, not so incidentally, went on to live to age 93!

of five children, Claire set off on a career that expanded year after year.

It was in high school, in Westerley, that she won her first award. Those of our readers who attended high school during World War II, may be surprised to learn that Claire's high school offered three years of the Italian language during those war years, even at the time when Italy was part of the Tripartite Axis (Germany, Italy, Japan). An explanation for including Italian in the curriculum during those war years may have been that her community included a strong Italian population. After studying Italian for three years. Claire won her high school's "Dante Prize."

Following graduation from college in Rhode Island, she began her post-college career beginning in 1952 as a teacher of English in Jeffersonville, Vermont, where she continued her teaching, of English and French.

It was at the University of Colorado at Greeley, that she earned her Master's degree and Ph.D. degree in college student personnel administration.

Next came her role as Vice-President of Student Affairs at the University of Jamestown, in North Dakota, where she taught statistics for five years.

In 1972, Claire came to Sacramento where she worked for twenty years until her retirement for the California Department of Education's Special Studies unit, evaluating school programs supported by state and federal funds. During that time, she also received her Master's degree in Computer Science.

Upon her retirement, Claire received formal recognition from the California State Senate for 42 years of service to the education community.

In Sacramento, Claire made her home with a friend of more than 50 years, who died in
