Guest Suite

If you would like to reserve the guest suite for your family and/or friends, please call or stop by the office and reserve at your earliest convenience. If you need to cancel, please let us know as soon as possible or you may be charged one night's stay. The price will increase slightly in 2018 at \$85 per night starting February 1st.

There is a limit of 3 consecutive days maximum. Two person maximum occupancy; additional guests may stay in the resident host's apartment. Check in at 3pm Monday-Saturday; 4pm on Sundays. Please pick up keys in the office and have form of payment ready.

Check out at 11am. Please return keys to the office (or place in the drop box by the office door).

One meal per person in the dining room is included per paid night (not to exceed two meals per day).

Holiday meals are excluded. Smoking is prohibited. No pets allowed.

Overnight Guests

Your overnight guests must check in at the office. It's important that the office know who is staying on the property. The safety of your guest(s) is your responsibilty. Additionally, residents are responsible to make guests aware of our community policies. The management is not liable for injury to guests or damage to their property while visiting. Guests are permitted for a maximum of 7 consecutive days or up to 14 days per year unless due to unforeseen circumstances and with prior manager's approval. Rental of the Guest Suite is excluded form this guideline.

Featured Resident by Shirley Riemer

As we meet one of our newer Campus Commons residents, Judy Thompson, we duly note her forty-two years as a dental hygienist. But, let's regard those forty-two years as just a prelude. It's the "what happened next" that carries her story.

In her earlier life, living in Minneapolis, Judy graduated from the University of Minnesota, preparing her for that long career in dental hygiene, which continued after she moved to Chicago, where she lived for a time – married, and raising two daughters.

Our story begins, however, after Judy and her family moved to San Jose, when she became interested in glass – stained glass, that is.

In fact, she became so interested that she took a course in the basics of cutting and soldering glass, all the while practicing by making small glass objects. In fact, her interest grew to the point that she set up a glass workshop in her home. Gradually, that workshop filled with sheets of stained glass.

Along the way, as she puttered about in her workshop, it became obvious that she was modeling her work in glass after the world-wide master of stained glass windows and lamps, Louis C. Tiffany, the American artist who famously declared that he considered glass to be "the most beautiful of all the jewels."

Later, having moved to Chico, California, where she and her family remained for twenty-eight years, Judy happened upon a shop window displaying Tiffany lamps. At first sight, she exclaimed to herself, "I can do that!"

It was that self-motivated discovery that spurred her on to her adventure – creating Tiffany reproduction lamp shades, as well as other articles displaying those same brilliant pieces of stained glass.

So, she set to work making her own Tiffany reproduction lamp.

It takes Judy four to six months to create a Tiffany reproduction lamp from her home workshop. It's really hard work, she says. Briefly, this is how it goes: she puts a sheet of stained glass on a light box and cuts it according to the colors desired. Then, she grinds the pieces of glass to fit exactly the Tiffany pattern.

Each piece is taped and tacky-waxed, then placed on the mold. After all the pieces are placed, lead is traced around each piece, they are bound together, and the lead binding is smoothed out before the work is removed from the mold.

She gave her third Tiffany reproduction lamp to her daughter as a gift following her graduation from law school (by the way, Judy also spent time working for her daughter's law firm, handling payroll and other law-office business matters).

Besides these lamps, Judy has also produced a number of stained-glass windows, two of which she has sold at an auction. She was proud to learn that one of her lamps, titled "Water Lily," was featured in the 1999 calendar of the Association of Stained Glass Lamps and Artists.

We may be surprised to learn that the Tiffany-lamp craze has extended into another area of stained-glass projects – known as "Butterfly Ladies," which display large, intricately designed, stained glass "butterfly wings" on the small metal figure of a woman.

And what does Judy do with her stainedglass creations? She gives them away as gifts. A good number of very lucky people are enjoying them at this very moment!
