XXIII Winter Olympics

From February 9–25, the world's greatest athletes will compete for gold medals and glory at the XXIII Winter Olympics. South Korea will host the winter games in Pyeongchang, a city in Gangwon Province, high in the Taebaek Mountains of the north.

Chief among the battles to play out on snow and ice will be the contest for men's hockey gold. For the past five Winter Olympics, players from the National Hockey League have participated in the Olympics. This year, the NHL is not building a break into its schedule to allow players to compete in the Olympics, a matter that is not sitting well with the athletes. The USA hopes to compete with Russia, Canada, Sweden, and Finland for the coveted medal.

Elsewhere on the ice, Russia's 17-year-old, Evgenia Medvedeva, is favored for gold in women's figure skating, but 17-year-old American, Karen Chen, is an up-and-coming phenom who might surprise the world. On the men's side, American Nathan Chen could take gold if he continues to impress with innovative new jumps.

On the slopes, Americans Lindsey Vonn and Mikaela Shiffrin are poised to make a run for gold in downhill skiing. Shaun White, red-haired maestro of the snowboard half-pipe, has been a fan favorite since he took gold in 2006.

Canada took gold in men's and women's curling in 2014. Will they repeat? While Germany swept all luge events in the Sochi Olympics, the Austrians will provide stiff competition this time. In bobsleigh, Nigeria will attempt to field its first-ever team as three former women's track stars introduce the cool sport to the African continent. And beyond sports, South Korea is introducing innovative technological advances to the Olympics—virtual reality will change the way we watch the games. These winter games are sure to offer both sport and spectacle.

February's Featured Resident by Shirley Riemer



Frank Palmer arrived at Campus Commons with his wife, Genelle, in November last year. Hailing from Carmel, California, he earned his B.A. at UC Berkeley, his M.S. in Public Health and Microbiology from UCLA, as well as a

Doctorate in Environmental Science and Engineering.

Just out of college, Frank joined the Peace Corps in Panama, then trained for fourteen weeks in Puerto Rico, when he went to the mountains of Panama to work with the Ngobe Indians. Later, he worked in Athabaskan and Aleut villages with Vista. He even became a commercial salmon fisherman, working with an all-Aleut crew.

Frank, as a senior scientist for the state of California, monitoring ocean water quality, was involved in setting standards for the state. For the 23 years before his retirement, he headed the Ocean Standards unit, which developed California's specific regulations, which are now part of state law.

Even with such beginnings in an all-absorbing career, Frank never hesitated when he saw an opportunity for robust outdoor adventures, notably in the Sierra.

It was common for him to set out on backpacking ventures, two or three weeks at a time, hiking and climbing in the Sierra – often engaged in adventures with bears.

He soon found that those black bears of the Sierra, generation after generation, became wiser in the art of stealing backpackers' food, with the mother bears teaching their cubs any new tricks that they themselves had learned. Thus, it became more and more difficult for hikers to protect their food from hungry, and wiser, bears.

One attempt of campers who tried to blind an encroaching bear with the beam from a flashlight, turned out to be ineffective. Frank tells of another tactic that seldom worked – pounding together two smashed metal cups, which, when clanged, made such an abrasive sound that the bear certainly heard – but resulted in no retreat.

In the winter, Frank maintained his devotion to the outdoors, especially in the Sierra, through snowshoeing and back-country skiing. In other seasons, he was an avid participant in marathons.

Frank's best friend in college often invited him to his home in Berkeley. On one of those visits, Frank's father went along with him and met his friend's mother. The two got along so well that they eventually became engaged! Thus, the mother of Frank's friend would become Frank's step-mother!

As the wedding day was approaching, Frank and his friend were driving through a small town in Nebraska, in a car showing California license plates – and, incidentally, carrying a snake tied up in a pillowcase. The Nebraska police officer questioned the two young fellows as to where they were heading. Frank's friend replied, "I'm going to my mother's wedding." Frank replied, "I'm going to my father's wedding." With those satisfactory responses, the officer let them pass on – thankfully without having spotted the snake in the pillowcase.

Frank to this day maintains a close friendship with his step-mother, whom he knows as "Petie." Frank and Genelle visit Petie and her two sons every summer in Vermont. They have all been good friends for years.

Incidentally, Frank had hardly become settled at Campus Commons before he went on a search for fellow bridge players, starting by posting a notice in the elevator to inquire about possible bridge devotees. His inquiries paid off. He is now content in his search, enjoying every week the bridge games that he has long found so stimulating.
