

Making History, I Presume

David Livingstone may have been a Scottish missionary and physician, but he is most famous for his explorations of Africa during the 19th century. Livingstone was one of the first Europeans to see the Zambezi River and Victoria Falls, cross the continent from west to east, as well as witness the harsh realities of the slave trade, which made him a staunch abolitionist. Livingstone's travels across the little-known continent made him an international celebrity, and when he disappeared in 1866 on a search for the source of the Nile River, many feared him

dead. American journalist and explorer Henry Morton Stanley mounted an expediton to find him and departed the island of Zanzibar off Africa's eastern coast on March 21, 1871. Eight months later, with most of his team decimated by disease and the rest having deserted him, Stanley arrived in the village of Ujiji on the shore of Lake Tanganyika. It was there that Stanley saw a bearded white man and said, "Dr. Livingstone, I presume?" Stanley's presumptuous words became as famous as the old explorer himself.

I have been fortunate in having been able to visit a good chunk of the world. The question that frequently comes up is, "How do you handle the language barrier?" Actually, this isn't that much of a problem. If you stick to the tourist program, you will find that English is pretty much spoken everywhere. International jet airline travel must take much of the credit for this. If a person wants to become an airline pilot, being fluent in English is a must because that is the language spoken by the world's control towers. As is so often the case, this reminds me of a story.

A German pilot flying a German-made plane for a German airline was landing at a German airport. He radioed in for landing instructions in German. The tower informed him that he must speak English. When he protested that he was a German in a German plane, in Germany, and didn't understand why he had to speak English.

At this point another pilot cut in on the channel and, in a very British voice, answered, "Because you lost the bloody war!

It used to be that languages were categorized. French was the language of diplomacy, German of science and engineering, Spanish of trade and business, Italian of music. And the beat goes on. But in the world today, English has pretty much taken over everything.

Having lived in Saudi Arabia for thirty years and taking every course in Arabic I could, I managed to pick up quite a bit of the language. But as any good teacher will tell you, they learned as much from their students as they taught them. I volunteered to teach ESL, English As a Second Language, after my regular work hours at the local Arab school to Arab employees who were, for the most part, illiterate in their own language. After several years of this, I came out of it speaking pretty good Arabic, but most important, I had learned to read and write Arabic too.

Unfortunately, I have lost a lot of this skill. If you don't use it, you lose it. There is not a big demand for Arabic in Keene.

Actually, English is considered a Germanic language, like Danish, Norwegian, Dutch, Yiddish, and others. English grammar and sentence structure is quite similar, as are many words. Italian is Latin based, as is Spanish and Portuguese, Russian and the Slavic tongues derive from Greek, Japanese and other Far-Eastern style pictographic-writing can call Chinese a parent. Arabic is closely related to Hebrew.

We are lucky that here in the United States we all speak the same language, unless you go to New York, or Boston, or Down-East Maine, or the Deep South, or Texas, or the Mid-West. Actually, I'm sorry I brought the matter up.

St. Paddy's Pastimes Debunked



A popular toast on St. Patrick's Day is "May the roof above us never fall in, and may the friends beneath it never fall out."

The world will be draped in green on March 17, when St. Patrick's Day a blue flag over Ireland during the celebrations take place across the globe in honor of the patron saint of Ireland. But if you really want to celebrate the right way, be sure to take a look at these facts behind St. Patrick.

St. Patrick may be one of Ireland's patron saints (along with St. Brigid and St. Columcille), but he was not Irish. Evidence suggests that he was, in fact, British. By some accounts, he was born with the name Maewyn Succat in either Scotland or Wales. Yet it is important to realize that even though St. Patrick may have been born in Britain in the year 390, at the time of his birth. Britain was occupied by the Romans. Thus, it is very likely that Patrick's family was from Roman aristocracy. Indeed, St. Patrick may have been Italian.

But don't trade in Irish green for Italy's tricolor green, white, and red just yet. The true color of Ireland

March 3 is a special day in Japan. *Hinamatsuri*, known as both Doll's Day and Girls' Day, is a day to celebrate girls and pray for their health and happiness. Families either buy a set of dolls when their first daughter is born or receive a set handed down from generation to generation. 
might be blue. King Henry VIII flew

Don't Fear the Ides



The word ides comes from the Latin idus, which means "half-division."

It was William Shakespeare, via his play Julius Caesar, who warned that the Ides of March, on March 15, were cursed. Indeed, while Caesar was murdered by a group of political conspirators on March 15, the Ides of any month are not particularly evil or ignominious. The words Ides, Kalends, and Nones are terms used to describe any month's phases of the moon. Ides simply

means the first full moon of the month, so in reality the Ides of March technically takes place this year on March 31. Likewise, the Kalends marks the month's first new moon, which is on March 17, and the Nones is the moon's first quarter, on March 24. Far from cursed, March's Ides were considered particularly joyful because they also heralded the new year and start of spring.
