Resident of the Month

THERESA E. comes from a long family line of farmers so it's no surprise she was such a big help in planting our flowers in the garden earlier this spring! Her first job cutting apricots for Del Monte made her the fourth generation agricultural worker! After the apricots were cut, she'd place them on a linen cloth frame to be put in the dryer to later be packaged as dried fruit. Her great-grandfather owned acres and acres of land in what is now Livermore, California, near Oakland. He had a contract with Bird's Eye for making jarred baby food. Her grandfather, Antone, had a farm in Alameda County, CA where he grew cherries. Some of Theresa's most cherished memories are the times she had visiting her grandfather's orchard. He enjoyed donating some of his crop to the church. He would drive his farm truck to the convent in Oakland where he would pick up a truckload of nuns and bring them back to the farm to pick as many cherries as they wished to bring home to the convent for canning. Her father, Nicolas, worked as a field man for Hunts.

Teresa never owned her own farm, but when she bought her first house here in Springfield, she grew her own large and varied vegetable garden with multiple beds. She thoughtfully planned her complex garden based on which bugs and birds are local to the area, and climate; strategies she learned from her grandfather. Her children say Theresa has always been very passionate about her gardens. She's moved many times since her original house in Springfield but wherever she has moved, a garden was sure to be planted there.

Even though Theresa has spent so much time working outdoors, gardening and on the farm, there was a short while before having her children where she experienced major city life in San Francisco. It was the 60's and Theresa worked at Psalm's Café on Haight Street and lived on Ashbury Street. She and her husband at the time, ended up buying the business and owned it for a few years before reselling. The restaurant was on the corner of a beautiful historic building that is still there today. It was the restaurant's tradition to serve Thanksgiving dinner to the local homeless population every year. Teresa lived just a few blocks away from one of her favorite musicians at the time, Janis Joplin! She loved going to concerts with her best girlfriends. She saw bands like Hot Tuna, The Grateful Dead, and The Starship. Some of her good friends were in a band called, "The Down Home Nasties." Teresa loved hanging out with the band and going to their shows.

Two of her life-long friends from San Francisco, Bonnie and Deborah Jean, later moved to Eugene. Theresa bussed from San Francisco to Eugene to visit her friends on the The Grey Rabbit bus line. She decided she liked the area and ended up moving to The Whittaker neighborhood where she started her family and had three children. She has called Lane County her home ever since!

Theresa has a ton of family history, personal stories, and knowledge she loves sharing and remembers quite vividly! If you haven't had the chance to chat with her yet, she would love to swap stories involving music, the 70s, gardening, different cultures, and religions!
