club. He has traveled extensively in the Adirondacks gathering material for his five books on the Adirondack fire towers, the Civilian Conservation Corps camps and Adirondack lore, and will share the joys of fully experiencing the Adirondacks and getting to know its local people and places.

From the Historian: Lila Lee

In 1910, Lila Lee, born Augusta Wilhelmena Fredericka Appel, started her career in Vaudeville as a child performer. She was given the nickname "Cuddles," and this name stuck with her the rest of life. In 1918, she was offered a movie contract by a company that later would become Paramount Studios. Lila was a very popular actress and would make multiple movies within the same year. She has over one hundred film credits to her name and a star on the Hollywood Walk of Fame.

Unfortunately, her demanding career took a toll on her health and in the 1930's she was diagnosed with tuberculosis. Lila came to Saranac Lake to cure at the Will Rogers Hospital. Friends, such as George Jessel, would come and visit her at Will Rogers. She did partially recover and tried to go back to acting. In a disappointing comeback attempt, she only appeared in a few television shows and a couple of movies following her recovery. With her career over, she moved back to Saranac Lake due to her ongoing health problems. In 1973, Lila Lee died of a stroke. —By Leslie Hoffmann

Gail enjoyed raising her three children, Anne, Phillip and Barry, and in true Gail fashion she was always doing many things. She was president for a community center in Palisades New York, sang in a choir, worked in a bank, was a file clerk for the Graphic Artists International Union and was a nanny for two chil-

dren whose parents worked at the White House. Eventually, she worked for a conductor at the Kennedy Center, scheduling auditions, picking up artists at the airport and making arrangements for their accommodations. She continued to sing whenever the opportunity arose including for the Choral Arts Society and at Kennedy Center. Later in life she attended the former Westminster Music Camp, staying at Camp Solitude in Lake Placid, which is how she found out about Will Rogers.

Since her arrival, Gail has become involved in many activities. She is the founder and manager of "The Nook," which is the Will Rogers store, sings with the Will Rogers Singers and The Adirondack Singers, organizes the Will Rogers scrapbook, has helped plan events, prints and stores our photos and is always taking part in scheduled activities.
