June's Featured Resident by Shirley Riemer

After young Doris Jones (whom we know as Doris Forward). graduated from high school in her hometown of Youngstown. Ohio, she soon landed a job working for the local Superintendent of Schools.



One day, a recruiter from Washington

showed up in town, searching for high school students and graduates who might be interested in taking jobs in government. Doris jumped at the chance.

But, her mother wept, fearing with good reason, that her daughter would be traveling far beyond Youngstown, Ohio. Yet, what her parents could not have realized then was from that time on they were about to enjoy a number of exciting trips to visit Doris where she would be working in so many of the "hot spots" where United States history would be made.

For her first year in government, 1951, Doris worked for the Veterans Administration, followed by eight years working for California Congressman, Pat Hillings.

During the 1959-60 presidential campaign, she traveled with Richard Nixon's campaign for President (which he lost). Traveling along on this campaign was Pat Nixon, who, with experience teaching in a secretarial school, worked alongside Doris throughout the campaign. The two became friends.

Doris worked for U.S. Senators George Murphy, John Heinz, and Pete Wilson, who then became governor.

Doris recalls landing one day on Air Force Two at the Executive Airport in Los Angeles, at a time in her busy career when, because she didn't have time to have her hair done, she was wearing a wig. On this occasion, standing outside the plane after the landing, she was hit with a whoosh of air as another plane landed, causing her wig to go flying off her head and hitting Finch on the leg. Doris gallantly rescued the wig and planted it back on her head where it belonged.

She served eight years in the Governor's office, and 35 years later, she continues to work for him, in charge of making his personal travel arrangements.

The highlight of Doris' career was her twoyear assignment in the White House in 1971-72, where she worked in the West Wing for Robert Finch, a counselor to President Nixon.

After three losing campaigns, Doris moved to New York, where she worked for the president of an international bank. But Washington lured her back when George Murphy became a senator.

Much later in her career, Doris, at age 53, left her assignment with Senator John Heinz to marry, for the first time. Her husband, Buzz Forward, took her to live in an equestrian community outside Los Angeles, where her life changed dramatically.

She had to learn to ride a horse. She had to learn to cook. She even had to figure out why a neighbor would knock on her door to deliver three kittens, which most "country folks" would understand as essential for keeping down the mouse population in the horse barn.

In fact, on her wedding day, on the way to the church, she had to stop off at the barn, while wearing her wedding dress, to feed the horses before leaving to be married.

In 2011, Doris and Buzz Forward retired to live here at Campus Commons, a lively pair, both loaded with stories and high humor. Buzz died in 2014. Doris lives on here cheerfully, embracing the memories with her dog Jerry.
