# \$20,000 Donation to benefit Gap Fund presented by Pythagoras Lodge #41

# Transition to Assisted Living: Some Points to Consider

Most seniors delay the decision to move to assisted living because they want to stay in their home as long as possible. They are concerned about finances. They fear losing their independence. They know things will really change when they make the move.

At some point, seniors recognize that their current living situation is becoming too much to handle. Driving, cooking, cleaning, shopping, paying bills and maintaining the home are all activities that get neglected when a senior can no longer manage the home. This is especially true if one spouse is the full-time caregiver of the other.

Why do people move into assisted living? There are two main reasons. The first is memory issues. One in nine Americans over 65 has Alzheimer's or some form of dementia.

If your loved one cannot remember to feed his/ her pet or pay the bills, maintaining an independent life is difficult. Family members notice that things are not getting done. This starts the conversation about moving to an environment where the senior can still live fairly independently, but gets help with medication management, or getting in and out of the shower. living is mobility issues. At some point in the aging process, seniors begin to have balance and stamina issues. They sometimes feel unsteady and lose energy quickly when they are moving around. Being in an assisted-living environment allows them to freely move around while aware that staff are watching, should they need assistance.

Another factor in the decision to move to assisted living is cost. Depending on which community you choose, the cost can range from \$3,000 to \$7,000 per month, based on how much care the person needs.

If a person does not have the funds, they can apply for Medicaid. The only challenge with this is that there are not enough Medicaid facilities to accommodate all of the seniors needing care. This has resulted in huge wait lists for those who need assisted living that is paid for by Medicaid. The Eastern Star Masonic Retirement Campus does offer Medicaid, but we have a lengthy wait list.

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# Meet Jonathon Hoyt, Director of Memory Care

Jonathon Hoyt was born and reared on the South Side of Chicago, but moved to Charleston, Illinois, at 17 years of age to attend Eastern Illinois University (EIU). He graduated from EIU with a B.S. in Family and Consumer Sciences, concentrating in Family Services, and a minor in Psychology.

Six months later, he was invited to return to EIU and pursue a masters degree in Gerontology while working as a graduate assistant for the Aging Services Department. During his time in Graduate School, he also had the opportunity to work as the community liaison for the Coles County Council on Aging and Eastern Illinois University.

Shortly after completing his masters program, Hoyt moved to Colorado, and spent a little under two years, working as both an administrative specialist, and a case manager in mental health. He also has two years of experience as a caregiver, working with both seniors and individuals with intellectual and physical disabilities.

Hoyt thoroughly enjoys having the opportunity to work with a senior population. Many people view memory care as the "last step" for the individuals who reside



here, but he likes to look at memory care as the "next journey" in life for ESMRC residents.

## A day in the life of an ESMRC Memory Care resident

Most ESMRC residents start their day between 6 and 7 am, although there are a few early risers who are up sometimes at 4 am or earlier. During these morning hours, residents are greeted by one of the Memory Care staff, who help the resident with completing their morning activities of daily living (ADLs) before coming to breakfast.

Some residents simply require a verbal prompting to complete these ADLs, while others require a physical assist. Nevertheless, resident assistants are trained and ready to provide care at the level that is required for each resident individually. As much as possible, residents are allowed to maintain their independence.

After eating breakfast, residents are encouraged to gather together in the activity room where they will be able to participate in morning exercises, daily chronicle reading, music therapy, and various other activities. Those residents who choose not to participate in the larger group activities are encouraged by staff to engage in individual activities of leisure to promote mental stimulation.

Another part of the morning routine that both residents and staff enjoy is the fresh-baked treats. Every morning, during the large group activity, staff will prepare fresh-baked treats such as cookies, brownies, banana bread, etc., for the residents. When appropriate, residents may assist with preparing the treats.

Lunch is typically served between 11:30 am and noon. During this time, some of the staff are encouraged to eat and spend time with the residents, while noting when anyone experiences issues during their meal. After lunch, many residents use this time to relax either in their apartments or in the common area. Others choose to engage in individual activities of leisure.

# The importance of FUN at ESMRC

In addition to the daily activities happening at Eastern Star Masonic Retirement Campus, residents may participate in special events and entertainment, when possible. All of these activities are planned with the idea that family and friends may attend with the residents, as well,

One of these events is the annual Senior Prom. This year's theme was Sock Hop Senior Prom. The entire campus, which includes residents, family and friends, are invited to attend the dance.

Job's Daughters, Rainbow Girls and DeMolay sponsor the event. There are never too many dancers. Oftentimes, residents physically are not able to get up and dance, but they love to watch those that can "cut a rug." Chances are, they are reminiscing about the days they danced.

We also have a weekly Happy Hour, with live entertainment, during which residents and volunteers get the opportunity to dance.

A dedicated volunteer from the Eastern Star family comes in every Sunday afternoon to do a sing-a-long with residents. This is everyone's chance to use their singing voice, no matter how good they are.

Occasionally, we have a Drum Circle on Sunday afternoon! Residents really get their frustrations out on these days!

Another favorite is pets and children. We have several opportunities when school children visit

> the campus. There have been some special bonds made between these children and residents.

> For the pet-loving residents, we have the Canine Companions Puppy Training, as well as individual therapy dogs visiting on a regular basis. We have even had a miniature horse and pigs visit residents at the campus!

At 2 pm, the staff will begin to encourage all residents to gather together again, to participate in group activities, or individual activities of leisure. During this time, many residents enjoy playing bingo, working a puzzle with one another, or crafting and comparing various artistic creations.

Dinner is typically served at 5 pm. By this time, many of the residents begin to grow weary after having a day full of engaging activities. After dinner, staff encourages residents not to go to bed right away. They may participate in one last group activity for the evening. Aroma-therapy moisturizing is one of the many evening activities that the residents may enjoy. This activity is intended to relax the residents, and improve their quality of sleep. It

also soothes pain and inflammation, while improving overall skin health.

After the evening activity, most residents retire to their apartments. Some will remain in the common area to watch the evening news, Golden Girls, or another evening program on the television.






