Midterm elections (since 1932, the only exceptions have been the 1934 and 2002). Republicans currently hold a 51 to 49 edge in the Senate, while Democrats need to win a net of 23 seats in the House of Representatives to gain the majority, the more likely path to power in 2018. Democrats controlling either house would make the President's legislative path even more difficult than it already is, and with control of the House of Representatives and its investigative committees, Democrats would be under heavy pressure to consider anew issues concerning Russia, collusion, obstruction, emoluments, and conflicts of interest, with the power to impeach the President and other members of his administration.

What are the Issues?

Winning campaigns usually depend on which party or candidate is able to shape key issues and voter perceptions of them to their advantage.
