Bottled Art

Artisans have been creating miniature models of



fully rigged ships inside bottles for centuries. Perhaps you, too, could master this secret art on October 4. Ship in a Bottle

Day. The first mention of putting objects, including ships, in bottles dates back to 1719, when the art was popularized by a German named Matthias Buchinger. What made the feat even more spectacular was that Buchinger was born without hands or legs and grew to only 29 inches tall. Despite these handicaps, Buchinger earned renown throughout Europe as an artist, magician, musician, marksman, calligrapher, nd performer. From 1719, it became a common German folk art form to place objects in bottles, mainly depictions of saints. The oldest surviving ship in a bottle dates back to 1784. The three-masted Portuguese warship resides in a closed egg-shaped bottle. Ships in bottles were not only made by sailors to pass time on a long journey

or to give as gifts, but historians think that many ships in bottles were created by lighthouse keepers, who had both the time and access to materials for creating these maritime models.

Gloria Soto's childhood was lonely. As an only child, living in Chicago, Gloria spent her

early years at home with her Italian parents – whom Gloria cannot remember as ever having had a discussion with one another. Both parents worked fulltime. Her school friends were never welcome in their home.



The only family activity Gloria can recall in those early years in

Chicago, were the weekly streetcar trips to their family plot in the local Victory Garden - to cultivate their own little plot, harvest the crops, and take them back home on the streetcar. Starting at age 13, Gloria's social life picked

up when she and her mother moved to South San Francisco. During her high school years there, she found that she loved to dance! In fact, Gloria teamed up with a girlfriend, and together they performed dance routines for school assemblies throughout their high school years.

But here, dear reader, begins the absolute best story of Gloria's life:

When she was 15 years old, Gloria and a high school girlfriend went on a double-blind date - to a drive-in movie. In the car, Gloria happened to mention her age: 15. Immediately, her blind date exclaimed, "We're going home! I don't want any jail-bait in my car!" (Gloria's blind date was six vears older-age 21.) He took Gloria home immediately.

Two years passed. Then one day in a local "creamery" – a popular place for young people to gather to drink Cokes and smoke cigarettes ("it was like a drugstore, "Gloria explains) - some fellows congregated to the area where the girls were sitting. (It was learned later that one of those fellows had asked, "who's that girl over there?" Answer: Her name is "Gloria.") So the guy called out with a flip remark: "Hey Gloria, when are we going out?"

Gloria, deciding to act just as much the smartaleck, shot back with: "OK, what about Friday at 7 p.m.?"

For the next six months or so, Gloria and her new friend Bob – the failed blind date of two years earlier – played hide-and-seek with her mother, with Bob parking his car at agreed upon locations where Gloria would know where to meet him. One day, Bob announced, "I have a surprise for you." It was an engagement ring! Gloria could not let her mother see it, so she wore it around her neck for three months and hid it under her pillow at night. There was no way that Gloria could introduce Bob to her mother, who strongly disapproved of the match. Reason: Bob was not Italian!

One day, upon Bob's return from the U.S. Army, Gloria invited him to her home to watch TV – and to meet her mother. The couple set themselves down in the living room, waiting for Gloria's mother to emerge from the bedroom to meet Bob. They waited. And they waited. Gloria's mother never did emerge.

Just one year after that call-out joke at the creamery – "Hey Gloria, when are we going out?" – Gloria and Bob were married – "The best day of my life," Gloria recalls. "God was on my shoulder." The marriage, blessed with three children, went on joyfully for the rest of her husband's life - for 55 years.

Gloria recalls that late in the marriage, when the couple moved to the mountains, Bob taught city-girl Gloria what living in the country was like. For the first time in Gloria's life, there was a garden. There were deer everywhere. Gloria saw her first turtle of a lifetime. There was a pond, with fish. Gloria bought food for the deer and fed them daily. She gave a name to every deer.

"These were my happiest days," she says. "My husband did all this for me - he taught me so much!"
