

January's Featured Resident by Shirley Riemer

Caroline Brown, a recent arrival at Campus

Commons, born in Berkshire, England, emigrated to America from England at age 24, having lived through the horrors of World War II.



A few years before her

emigration, her aunt in Seattle, Washington, visiting Caroline's mother in England, proposed the possibility of sponsoring Caroline and her brother Henry if they would emigrate to America. Caroline's mother did not accept the offer, however, stating instead that when Caroline reached age 21, she could decide for herself whether to emigrate.

When Caroline reached age 18, she was called up to service in the British army, serving for four and half years as a cook – feeding fellow soldiers who were being trained for battle.

During those years of army service, she was deeply involved as well in the construction of "barrage balloons," a device little-known by Americans during the war. "Barrage balloons" were very large, silver-colored balloons anchored to the ground or to ships of war by metal cables — their purpose being to serve as obstacles to low-flying enemy aircraft. Barrage balloons flew above Britain during the war and became a common feature of the British skyline.

In 1947, Caroline, at age 24, with her 26year-old brother Henry, emigrated to the United States, both sponsored by their aunt in Seattle. Left behind was their 10-year old brother, Frank.

In Seattle she met the man who would become her husband and the father of their daughter, Cheryl born in 1953.

Having studied for her naturalization papers, she passed the test to become an American citizen.

Following her arrival and her experiences in the United States, what impressed her most about our country were the expansiveness of our mountains and the snow. She had never before seen so much snow!

For about 30 years she worked in housekeeping for a Roman Catholic organization, the Sisters of Providence, in Seattle. Caroline, however, was a member of the Church of England. During those years she made many friends, spending time with them, mostly by sewing – making clothes for children, which were then donated to needy families. During these years, she and her cousin Elsie traveled to many countries around the world.

In 1970, 23 years after her arrival in America, Caroline and her brother Henry traveled back to England for a 3-week visit. By that time, her other brother, Frank, who had stayed behind, was 34 years old. During this trip, Caroline had considered moving back to England, but even so long after the war, she found living conditions in England to be harsh, and she decided to stay in America. Her brother Henry was surprised to learn how bad the conditions were in the country he had left many years before.

By the time she retired from the Sisters of Providence, Caroline was 85 years old. Now, having reached the age of 95, she is looking forward to celebrating her 100th birthday – in America.
