

Your words of affirmation go along way to boost the spirits of our team and re-focus them on the reason why they chose the greatest profession of all-time--caregiving.



Who am I?

He was born in Buckingham County, Virginia on December 19, 1875, the son of former slaves, James and Eliza Riddle Woodson. His father helped Union soldiers during the Civil War and moved his family to West Virginia when he heard that Huntington was building a high school for blacks. Coming from a large, poor family, he could not regularly attend school. Through self-instruction, he mastered the fundamentals of common school subjects by the age of 17. Wanting more education, he went to Fayette County to earn a living as a miner in the coal fields, and was able to devote only a few months each year to his schooling. Later attended the University of Chicago, where he was awarded an A.B. and A.M. in 1908. Woodson was ostracized by some of his contemporaries because of his insistence on defining a category of history related to ethnic culture and race. At the time, these educators felt that it was wrong to teach or understand African-American history as separate from more general American history. He died suddenly from a heart attack in the office within his home in the Shaw, Washington, D.C. neighborhood on April 3, 1950, at the age of 74.


Alice Smith Gibson



Alzheimer's disease is A progressive disease that destroys memory and other important mental functions.

Dementia is a group of thinking and social symptoms that interferes with daily functioning.

Although the two terms are often used interchangeably, Alzheimer's disease and dementia are two different terms. Dementia is an umbrella term used to describe several conditions and it includes Alzheimer's, as well as other conditions with shared symptoms. More than mere forgetfulness, an individual must have trouble with at least two of the following cognitive areas to be diagnosed with dementia:

- Memory
- Communication and speech
- Focus and concentration
- Reasoning and judgment

Visual perception (including trouble detecting movement, differentiating colors, or experiencing hallucinations). The assessment tools used to determine which stage of dementia a person is experiencing are meant to be a guide and a rough outline of what caregivers can expect and when they can expect it. Some symptoms may occur later than others, others may appear in a different order than the scale predicts, and some may not appear at all. Some symptoms may appear and then vanish, while others will continue to worsen over time. Because every person is different and dementia manifests itself uniquely, the speed at which dementia progresses varies widely, as 20 years.



Employee of the Month
