



A banjoist and guitarist, Bill will perform some original compositions as well as contemporary songs influenced by the era. In his rich, flexible baritone, Bill sings a wide range of songs spanning the traditional mountain music of Tennessee, popular folk music, topical quiet songs, rowdy pub singalongs and an increasing number of originals.



Bill has more than half a century of performing experience, appearing in almost every east coast state from Maine to Virginia and as far west as Colorado and Oregon. Recently he was invited to perform at the Third Annual UnampliFire Festival of World Wide Roots Music in London, a springtime event at the Master Shipwright's Mansion in Deptford, right on the Thames. Bill performed in front of at least 500 attendees at this festival

Resident Spotlight: Landon Kite
