## Resident Interview with Richard & Cleo Gates

Richard and Cleo Gates are the sweetest couple. They are our oldest married couple here at Chandler's Square. They have been married for 74 years, yes, 74 YEARS! They were both born in 1924, Richard in Sacramento, CA and Cleo in Childres, TX. Richard was the youngest of 4 children. Cleo had one sister and a half-brother. Cleo moved to Sacramento when she was 11 because her mother had recently become a widow. They had family in California and her mother was offered to work at a cannery. It was much better money than working at a restaurant for \$1 a day. As teenagers, Cleo and Richard were introduced by his friend and her cousin outside of a roller skating rink in Sacramento. When I asked what initially attracted them to each other, Richard immediately said. "Her legs!" Cleo chuckled and said, "I could tell that he was just a very nice boy." After roller skating, Richard said that he asked her out on another date but she told him that she already had plans the next two weekends (which she swears she did!). At first, he thought that she was turning him down, but he tried one more time for the third weekend and she replied, "Yes, absolutely." Cleo and Richard dated while he was attending Sacramento Junior College in order to get into the V5 Navy Cadet program. Cleo wanted to get married when he graduated, but Richard had been accepted into Navy flight school and had to move to Pensacola, FL. He told her that they would be married when he returned to Sacramento on leave.

True to his word, on his 30 days of leave he ran up to Cleo's front door with a beautiful ring, gave her a big kiss, and said, "Let's get married this week." They hopped on a train from Sacramento to Reno, Nevada to get married in 1945. For a good story, ask them about why they went to Reno to get married and how he got the money to buy her ring.

After the wedding, Richard was to be stationed in Fort Lauderdale, FL to learn how to fly Torpedo Bombers. They hopped in a car and drove over 3,000 miles to Florida. There was a gas ration in 1945 and you were not allowed to drive over 35mph... they laughed and said, "You can bet we were going much faster than that!" They reminisced about how Cleo would make them bologna sandwiches every day while sitting in the passenger seat.

Once they arrived in Florida, Richard had to live on base at the time, so Cleo rented a little apartment with one of the wives of sailor. She said they lived right near the beach and would walk down to the beach each day. Cleo's land lord was king enough to let the girls borrow an old Ford pickup truck to drive on base to visit their men.

Richard was in the Navy for many years and retired as a Lieutenant Commander. He stayed in the reserves and the two of them moved back home to Sacramento. His career took off here after he went to Stanford for graduate school of Credit and Financial Management. He then began working for an oil company.

Almost every weekend they would go up to Folsom Lake and water ski. Richard said that Cleo would water ski on one ski while holding the rope with her other foot and he was jealous! They had also become big sailors and were in sail boat competitions. Cleo was a "crew" and says she would, "climb up and set the bow and spinnaker while all of the other wives were sitting up in the club and drinking martinis!"

They had two little girls who they adored and now have two grandchildren. They sadly have since lost one of their daughters. They told me that she was an amazing woman. I asked the couple what the secret is to a happy marriage. Cleo said, "We always tried to make it good and have fun along the way. We never fought, we may have had disagreements every now and then but we never would yell at each other." Richard chimed in saying, "Compromise is key. I remember once I wanted to go camping and at first Cleo was hesitant to sleep in the dirt, but once she agreed, she had a blast."
