Bird of the Month – Raven



European and North American literature often portrays the large, black raven as a harbinger of doom. Yet native and ancient cultures revered ravens and considered them messengers of the gods. Larger than their close cousin the crow, ravens are adaptable and intelligent. Ravens can live in almost any

habitat and scavenge a range of foods, including fish, meat, seeds, fruit, and scraps from garbage dumpsters.

Like parrots, ravens can mimic sounds including wolves, foxes, car engines, other birds, and even human speech. They also gesture to one another with their beaks and actively play. They have been spotted sliding down snowy rooftops for fun and turning pinecones into toys to bat around with each other. Before finding their lifelong mate, teenage ravens hang out in "gangs" until they settle down in one territory with their chosen partner.

Birthstone – Turquoise

December's birthstone is the turquoise. Although found all over the world, it gets its name because it was prevalent in ancient Turkish culture. Turquoise was traded



at Turkish bazaars to Venetian merchants, who brought it to Europe. The Aztecs mined turquoise in an area now known as New Mexico, and a significant amount of turquoise today comes from Arizona. California. and Nevada. The stones are most commonly pale blue with veins of brown or black running through them, but they can also be dark blue or green.

Flower – Daffodil

Narcissus, more commonly known as the daffodil, is a beautiful flower that usually blooms in springtime. Its lovely, delicate white petals and yellowish orange center make it a gardening favorite. Most believe its name comes from the Greek myth of Narcissus,

a young man who was so taken by his own reflection in a pool of water that he fell in and drowned. In this story, a daffodil sprang up from the very spot where he had sat. Since the narcissus was often used for a medicine, others believe that the name is derived from the Greek word narke, which means "numbness."
