

Fun fact: People born in July are more frequently left-handed than those born in other months. Do you know who of our July birthdays is a southpaw?






Blueberry Mug Cake

If you are looking for an easy, sweet treat you can make on your own using one of Maine's favorite fruits, this is for you. This blueberry mug cake is perfect for breakfast, snack, or even dessert. Try it out!

 Mix 2 tablespoons butter (melted), 2.5 tablespoons sugar, 2 tablespoons milk, and 1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract in a small bowl.



- 3. Fold in 7-10 blueberries.
- 4. Pour into two microwave safe tea cups or one large mug, filling about halfway as this rises quite a bit.
- 5. Microwave for 1 minute, adding 15 seconds if needed.
- 6. Serve dusted with powdered sugar. Enjoy!

American's top five favorite ice cream flavors are: Vanilla, chocolate, cookies and cream, mint chocolate chip, and chocolate chip cookie dough.

Maine's most popular flavors are the classic vanilla and chocolate, followed closely by coffee and mint chocolate chip.

Melon Pops

Ingredients:

- 3-pound honeydew, cantaloupe or watermelon
- 2 tablespoons sugar
- Popsicle molds (you can buy these on Amazon or at your local dollar store)
- Popsicle Sticks

Instructions:

- 1. Using a blender, blend the melon and sugar until smooth.
- 2. Divide the mixture among the Popsicle molds, then insert Popsicle sticks.
- 3. Place in your freezer and leave overnight.

National Blueberry Month

July is National Blueberry Month so here's a little trivia:

"Blueberries for Sal" is a Maine famous children's picture book. It was written by Robert McCloskey in 1948 and awarded the Caldecott Honor in 1949.

Maine is the top producer of wild blueberries in the world but only produces 10 percent of all blueberries in North America.

Wild blueberries have the highest antioxidant capacity per serving, compared with over 20 other fruits. Within the deep-blue pigments of these berries, there are potent antioxidants that help prevent cell damage, protect against inflammation, and reduce age-related health risks.

Pantone named their 2020 color of the year "classic blue."

Firmenich named their 2020 flavor of the year "classic blueberry."

Indigenous people used to smoke their blueberries to preserve them through the winter.

There are over 50 varieties of blueberries in the world; only five of those are grown in the US.: Low-bush, Northern high-bush, Southern high-bush, rabbit-eye, and half-high.

There is a blueberry council in the U.S. – The U.S. Highbush Blueberry Council. Their website has information on nutrition as well as a bushel of recipes.


The weight of the heaviest blueberry, to date, is 11.28g (.4 oz). It was 1.35 inches in diameter, about the size of a quarter. It was measured in Lima, Peru in 2018 by the Guinness Book of World Records.


The object of the game is to fill all the blank squares with the correct numbers.

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All About Popsicles

July is usually a hot month in Maine and Popsicles are a great way to cool down. Here are some fun facts about Popsicles.

10 cool facts about Popsicles:



- The Popsicle was invented by an 11-year-old boy named Frank Epperson in 1905. Epperson accidentally left a cup of homemade soda on the porch overnight. When he woke up the next morning, the soda was frozen around the stirring stick. He realized it was a neat treat and called it the Epsicle.
- In 1923, Epperson renamed his treat the Popsicle and patented his project. Some stories claim he chose the name because his kids were always asking him to make "Pop's Sicles." Other stories claim it was to let consumers know that the treat was made from soda pop.
- 3. Popsicles were originally marketed as frozen drinks on a stick.
- The dual Popsicle featuring two sticks and one Popsicle that could be split in half was introduced during the Great Depression as a way to split the treat across two children for the same cost.
- 5. More than two billion Popsicles are sold each year.
- 6. Since "Popsicle" is a registered brand name, generic brands and international versions are forced to brand their product by another name.

You'll find ice pops in the isles of most American grocery stores, but in the British Isles you might hear ice lollies, and in Australia and New Zealand they're know as icy poles.

- 7. Popsicles are famous for their awful jokes! The often punfilled cheesy jokes on Popsicle sticks have become an Internet sensation with websites dedicated to sharing these groaners.
- 8. The number one Popsicle flavor is cherry!
- 9. Popsicles were chosen as a symbol of American Life by the Eighth Air Force Unit in World War II.
- 10. Originally, there were seven flavors of Popsicles available. Today, you will find a wide variety of flavors — everything from avocado to chili chocolate!

A 'Beautiful' Tribute

Expressing national pride "from sea to shining sea," the stirring anthem "America the Beautiful" turns 125 this month.

The song's lyrics are the words of a poem written by Katharine Lee Bates, who was an English professor at Massachusetts' Wellesley College. In 1893, while on a trip to Colorado, Bates visited Pikes Peak, and was struck by the view of natural beauty from the mountain and, in her words, "the sea-like expanse of fertile country ... under those ample skies."

Inspired, she finished her poem during the trip, but didn't publish it until two years later. The first version appeared in a weekly Massachusetts newspaper, The Congregationalist, on July 4th, 1895.

For a while, "America the Beautiful" was sung to the melodies of various folk tunes, including "Auld Lang Syne." But it was a hymn titled "Materna," composed in 1882 by Samuel A. Ward, that became the most common music for Bates' lyrics and is still used today.

"America the Beautiful" has become a patriotic standard and is often played at national celebrations and sporting events.




Meet Bonnie
