Mighty Mail-Order



On August 18, 1872, Aaron Montgomery Ward mailed out a catalog detailing the wares he had for sale at his dry goods business in Chicago. His 8 X 12-inch pricing sheet was the world's first mail-order catalog. Ward believed that people living in rural communities

wanted city goods and that he could provide them at an affordable cost. He mailed his goods from Chicago to rural train stations, where customers could pick them up. Country folk loved the wide selection of goods Ward was able to offer, and his idea gathered steam over the next few years. Rural retailers tried to thwart his success by burning the catalogs, to no avail. By 1883, Ward's modest pricing sheet had become a 240-page "Wish Book" filled with 10,000 items. Ward had become the titan of the mailorder business.
