#1 Halloween's origins can be traced back to the ancient Celtic holiday, Samhain, which celebrates the end of the harvest season. It was later combined with the Catholic holiday, All Soul's Day after Rome conquered the area known today as England and Ireland



#2 It was believed that on Samhain, the boundary between the dead and the living was blurred and the spirits returned to earth to join the living.



#3 In those days, people would dress in costume to confuse the spirits they believed were roaming the earth. They would also leave food outside their homes for the spirits to prevent them from entering.



#4 It is believed that trick-or-treating originated in England when the poor would go house to house to beg for food in exchange for songs or prayers for the dead





The calendula, pretty and practical, is the Birth Month Flower of October. Calendulas grew their name from blooming at the beginning of each month, hence the Latin "calends" and the English "calendar." The calendula means "throughout the months." This flower is used by many gardeners as an insect repellent and by cooks as a spicy seasoning or coloring for food.

Coronavirus tally: U.S. death toll inches closer to 200,000, as new cases rise by over 50,000 in a day

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The global tally for confirmed cases of the coronavirus that causes COVID-19 climbed to 31.36 million, according to data aggregated by Johns Hopkins University, while the death toll rose to 965,675. The U.S. continued to lead the world with 6.86 million cases and 199,890 deaths. There were 54,875 new cases reported in the U.S. and at least 428 new deaths on Monday, according to New York Times data. The new case tally compares with the daily average 41,812 over the past week. Brazil has the second highest death toll at 137,272 and third highest case tally at 4.56 million. India is third with 88,935 deaths and second with 5.56 million cases. Mexico is fourth with 73,697 deaths and seventh with 700,580 cases. The U.K. has 41,877 deaths and 401,127 cases, the highest death toll in Europe and fifth-highest in the world.
