We are excited to let you know that starting July 1st we will be entering Stage 2 at Glenwood Place. What does that mean? A little more freedom — read on!

Stage 2

Continue all Stage 1 Guidelines except:

Community Access

Activities

- No outside venders/volunteers for activities •
- No outside activities without staff to ensure social distancing
- Small Group Activities with no more than 10 participants, 2 times per week .
- Social distancing of at least 6-8 feet •
- All residents will wear masks whenever outside of apartments.

Transportation

Community provided transportation for medical purposes only, and only 1 resident per trip. Sanitizing between residents' trips will be completed.

Dining

- All tables should be spaced 6-8 feet apart May stop using paper/Styrofoam tableware for meals
- No more than 1-2 residents per table determined by size of the table Staggering of meals to accommodate decreased occupancy in dining area Disinfecting tables and chairs in between residents is completed.

My highest priority and goal will continue to be maintaining the safety of my residents and staff. I truly appreciate your diligence to the protocols that have been very fluid over the past 3 months and recognize the increased stress level you are all experiencing during this Pandemic. We will continue to follow the current protocols that are in place. These protocols are based on the CDC, State and County Health Department recommendations.
