#### One Snowy Night

Back in the 70's, I was editor for Lowell Lundstrom Ministries. Lowell was a traveling evangelist, on the road with his musical family and team at least 300 days a year. I worked on Message Magazine, monthly mailings, week-long crusades, one night rallies, weekend Marriage Enrichment Seminars, and books. One snowy night the ministry pilot, Joe Gruber and I headed from Minneapolis to Hibbing, Minnesota. The visibility was fair when we started out, but the wind picked up and the snow was falling fast. Gradually the storm turned into a blizzard. Joe turned to me with a worried expression on his face. "Look out the right side window and tell me if there is ice on the wing?" I looked and there was. There was nothing I could do to help except to pray – pray hard. "Joe," I asked "are you going to turn back to Minneapolis?" "We don't have enough fuel" he said. Finally we reached the Hibbing airport, but finding the airport was not the end of our predicament. By now the visibility was almost zero. That night Joe earned his reputation as a skilled pilot by landing without plowing into a snow drift or clipping the airport buildings. Joe parked the plane and we stumbled to the terminal. The airport was closed. Joe went from door to door to find a way in. I shivered in the cold. When we were about to give up, the last door was open. The janitor was just leaving to go home before the blizzard got worse. He said, "You knew the airport was closed. You could have lost your license or your lives!" He motioned to a pay phone, and Joe called the Hibbing Crusade director to come get us. Fortunately the janitor was willing to stay with us until the director arrived. The ordeal was over! What might have been a tragedy became the blessing of realizing once again, our lives are in God's hands. For that I am thankful. Credit goes to Joe Gruber; he got me to my destination – and especially to God for enabling him to do so.
