Microwaves and Styrofoam

Use cookware specially manufactured for use in the microwave oven. Generally, you should not use metal pans or aluminum foil because microwaves reflect off them. And you should not use some plastic containers because heated food can cause them to melt. The FDA recommends using glass, ceramic, and plastic containers labeled for microwave oven use.



While polystyrene foam or Styrofoam containers do a good job in protecting foods in the refrigerator, they are not made for the microwave. A form of plastic, the foam can melt in the microwave, allowing chemicals to be released into your food. Transfer the food to a microwave-safe container before heating.




