All About Gingerbread!

A Bit About Gingerbread

Gingerbread and the many shapes it takes has a long history. First appearing in ancient Greece and Egypt, gingerbread was used more



for ceremonial purposes. Later, gingerbread found its way to Europe when 11th-century Crusaders brought back ginger from the Middle East for the aristocrats' cooks to experiment with. As ginger and other spices became more affordable to the masses, gingerbread caught on and eventually became the gingerbread we know and love today!

Gingerbread Takes Form in Europe

An early European recipe for gingerbread consisted of ground almonds, stale breadcrumbs, rosewater, sugar and, naturally, ginger. The resultant paste was pressed into wooden molds. These carved works of art served as a sort of storyboard that told the news of the day, bearing the likeness of new kings, emperors and queens, or religious symbols. The finished cookie might be decorated with edible gold paint (for those who could afford it) or flat white icing to bring out the details in relief.

In the 16th century, the English replaced the breadcrumbs with flour, and added eggs and sweeteners, resulting in a lighter product. The first gingerbread man is credited to Queen Elizabeth I, who knocked the socks off visiting dignitaries by presenting them with one baked in their own likeness.

Gingerbread Today

Today, gingerbread is a baked sweet containing ginger and sometimes cinnamon, cloves, nutmeg, cardamom and anise, and sweetened with any combination of brown sugar, molasses, light or dark corn syrup, or honey. Gingerbread can take the shape of thin, crisp cookies like snaps, it can be dark, spicy and cake-like, sometimes, with lemon glaze, or even in the form of a house!

Gingerbread Houses

The gingerbread house became popular in Germany after the Brothers Grimm published their fairy tale collection which included "Hansel and Gretel" in the 19th century. Early German settlers brought this lebkuchenhaeusle (gingerbread house) tradition to the Americas.

Here is a bit of Raggedy Ann and Andy history:

Raggedy Ann is a character created by American writer Johnny Gruelle (1880-1938) that appeared in a series of books he wrote and illustrated for young children. Raggedy Ann is a rag doll with red yarn for hair and a triangle nose. Gruelle received US Patent D47789 for his Raggedy Ann doll on September 7, 1915. The character was created in 1915 as a doll, and was introduced to the public in the 1918 book "Raggedy Ann Stories." When a doll was marketed with the book, the concept had great success. A sequel, "Raggedy Andy Stories" (1920), introduced the character of her brother, Raggedy Andy.

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Hanukkah Begins!

What is Hanukkah?

Hanukkah, which is Hebrew for "dedication," is the Festival of Lights.

It commemorates the victory of the Maccabees over the Syrian Greek army, and the subsequent miracle of rededicating the Holy Temple in Jerusalem and restoring its menorah, or lamp.

The miracle of Hanukkah is that only one vial of oil was found with just enough oil to illuminate the Temple lamp for one day, and yet it lasted for eight full days.

How Do You Celebrate Hanukkah?

We celebrate Hanukkah at home by lighting the menorah (each night we light one additional candle to the number from the previous night), playing dreidel, and eating special foods unique to Hanukkah. Some people also sing Hanukkah songs or exchange gifts after lighting the menorah, which is also called a Hanukkah. Many people host and attend Hanukkah parties.

What Are Hanukkah Foods?

Many Hanukkah foods are deep-fried in oil, symbolizing the oil from the menorah used in the Temple. These include latkes, or potato pancakes, and jelly doughnuts. Other favorites include the Sephardic delicacy bimuelos and use, of course, applesauce as a latke topping. Chocolate gelt, a candy that gets its name from the Yiddish word for money, is another popular Hanukkah treat.

This year Hanukkah begins the evening of December 10th and goes through the evening of December 18th. We will be having a Hanukkah inspired refreshment grab and go in the Activity Room at 2:30 p.m.



Teen at the Wheel

In the early summer of 1953, I turned 16. There are certain privileges a 16-year-old expects; I was no exception. I could finally go on a date; that seemed important. I could legally drive; that was not important. I didn't want to drive, but my family awaited the day with undisguised anticipation.

I was one of a group of girls who looked forward

to spending a few nights a week at the library, ostensibly to study; but more importantly, to visit other friends and to see and be seen. Two of my friends already had licenses; my friend Lucille did not drive until she was almost 30 years old. I shared Lucille's sentiments that, as long as we had transportation everywhere we wanted to go, there was no need for a license.

My mother and stepfather, on the other hand, wanted me to ferry my younger brother and sister around and run errands for the family. So, for several weekends, my dad drove me to the vacant parking lot at the old Ford plant near the bay to practice my driving.

I should introduce you to my chariot. We had only one car; in fact, I did not know any two-car families in those days. We had my father's 1939 cream-colored Chevrolet coupe — the one he was proud to drive when he was a young man of 29, in love with life and in search of adventure. However, in 1953, it was almost 15 years old; and it was not an easy car to drive, if I may be allowed an understatement at this point. It was a stick shift, with no power anything. It was of the vintage that still had a crank by the front bumper to start it with, if the battery was dead. My dad was not one to waste a penny, so there were, indeed, days when someone would have to crank the car, while another someone moved the choke control in and out until the car ground to life. Automatic transmissions were just beginning to make an appearance in 1953; and anyone who took a driver's test in an automatic, was prohibited on his license from driving a stick shift.
