Where Did Valentine's Day Come From?

Valentine's Day, also called St. Valentine's Day, is a holiday when lovers express their affection with greetings and gifts. The holiday has origins in the Roman festival of Lupercalia, held in mid-February. The festival celebrated the coming of spring. At the end of the 5th century, Pope Gelasius I replaced Lupercalia with St. Valentine's Day. It came to be celebrated as a day of romance from about the 14th century.

Although there were several Christian martyrs named Valentine, the day may have taken its name from a priest who



was martyred about 270 CE by the emperor Claudius II Gothicus. According to legend, the priest signed a letter "From your Valentine" to his jailer's daughter. Other accounts hold that it was St. Valentine of Terni, a bishop, for whom the holiday was named, though it is possible the two saints were actually one person. Another common legend states that St. Valentine defied the Emperor's orders and secretly married couples to spare the husbands from war. It is for this reason that his feast day is associated with love.

Formal messages, or valentines, appeared in the 1500s and by the late 1700s, commercially printed cards were being used. The first commercial valentines in the United States were printed in the mid-1800s. Valentines commonly depict Cupid, the Roman god of love, along with hearts, traditionally the seat of emotion. Because it was thought that the avian mating season begins in mid-February, birds also became a symbol of the day. Traditional gifts include candy and flowers, particularly red roses, a symbol of beauty and love.

Black History Month

In 1915, historian Carter G. Woodson took notice of the lack of information on the accomplishments of Black people available to the public, leading him to become co-founder of the Association for the Study of Negro Life and History. In 1926, the group declared the second week of February as Negro History Week to recognize the contributions of African Americans to U.S. history. Few people studied Black history, as it wasn't included in textbooks and any information that was included was false.

1963 March on Washington

This week was chosen because it corresponded between birthdays of both Frederick Douglass, and former U.S. President Abraham Lincoln. President Lincoln led the United States during the Civil War, which was primarily fought over the enslavement of Black people in the country. Many schools and leaders began recognizing the week after its creation.

The week-long event officially became Black History Month in 1976, when U.S. President Gerald Ford extended the recognition to "honor the too-often neglected accomplishments of Black Americans in every area of endeavor throughout our history." Black History Month has been celebrated in the United States every February since.



Special Day in February

February 19, 1968, was the day "Mr. Rogers' Neighborhood" was first premiered, and everybody wanted to be Mister Rogers' neighbor. The show was produced in Pittsburgh at WQED Studios. Fred Rogers served as creator, host, head writer, lead musical composer, and chief-puppeteer and voice talent in the Neighborhood of Make-Believe. Talk about a good budget! Fred hosted this gentle, thoughtful children's show, and he treated every child as an intelligent, worthy and important person with valid feelings, thoughts and ideas.



Each episode was accompanied live-on-set by musicians led by musical director and pianist, Johnny Costa. Fred met regularly with his mentor, renowned child psychologist Margaret McFarland, to discuss child development theory, so that the show's scripts would authentically reflect the real concerns and feelings of children. Mister Rogers always managed to find wonder in seemingly everyday things, turning visits to factories, farms, and museums into engaging and educational journeys. If you would like to learn more about Mister Rogers and how his show changed the lives of many, there is a documentary out called, "Won't You Be My Neighbor?"

Mandi Gras Fun Facts

Mardi Gras became the celebration we know today because of a secret society.

Since its first impromptu celebrations in the early 1700s, Mardi Gras had been regularly cancelled or banned for its destructive drunken parties — that is until 1837, when a secret society known as the Mistik Krewe of Comus aimed to elevate the chaotic experience, replacing the debauchery with lavish balls and parades. Eventually, the "Fat Tuesday" celebrations of New Orleans garnered much support and enthusiasm, later establishing itself as the Mardi Gras capital of the country.

Will the Groundhog See His Shadow?

On February 2, 1887, Groundhog Day, was celebrated for the first time at Gobbler's Knob in Punxsutawney, Pennsylvania. As told by tradition, if a groundhog comes out of its hole and sees its shadow, it gets scared and



runs back into its burrow, predicting six more weeks of winter weather; no shadow means an early spring.

Groundhog Day has its roots in the ancient Christian tradition of Candlemas, when clergy would bless and distribute candles needed for winter. The candles represented how long the winter would be. Germans expanded on this concept by selecting a hedgehog as a means of predicting weather. Once they came to America, German settlers in Pennsylvania continued the tradition with a groundhog, which were plentiful in the state.

Groundhogs, also called woodchucks and whose scientific name is Marmota monax, typically weigh 12 to 15 pounds and live six to eight years. They eat vegetables and fruits, whistle when they're frightened or looking for a mate, and can climb trees and swim.

Chinese New Year

Chinese New Year is the biggest holiday in China. In 2021, Chinese New Year will begin on February 12th, and the animal is the Ox. Tied to the Chinese lunar calendar, the

holiday was traditionally a time to honor household and heavenly deities as well as ancestors. It was also a time to bring family together for feasting. With the popular adoption of the Western calendar in 1912, the Chinese joined in celebrating January 1st as New Year's Day. China, however, continues to celebrate Chinese New Year with the traditional greeting, "Kung hei fat choi."

Celebrating the New Year became the main focus throughout the country. The entire attention of the household was fixed on the celebration. During this time, business life came nearly to a stop. Home and family were the main focus.

In preparation for the holiday, houses were thoroughly cleaned to rid them of "huiqi," also known as inauspicious breaths, which might have collected throughout the past year. Cleaning was also meant to appease the gods who would be coming down from heaven to make inspections.

Ritual sacrifices of food and paper icons were offered to gods and ancestors. People posted scrolls printed with lucky messages on household gates and set off firecrackers to frighten evil spirits.

Many of the rituals carried out during this period were meant to bring good luck to the household and long life to the family members.



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
