Titanic Remembrance Day

Titanic Remembrance Day is dedicated to the memory of the Titanic, and over 1500 people who died. On this day in 1912, the Titanic sank in the icy waters of the north Atlantic Ocean.

The Titanic was called "unsinkable" and the "safest ship afloat" by her builder and designer. However, on her maiden voyage from England to New York City, the cruise ship Titanic hit an iceberg in the Atlantic Ocean. This occurred on April 14, 1912 at 11:40p.m. Two hours later, with a gaping gash in her side, the ship quickly sank in icy waters. 1522 passengers and crew died.

The historic sinking of the Titanic spurred a numerous of television documentaries, specials, and big screen movies. The most recent was the blockbuster movie *Titanic*, starring Leonardo DiCaprio and Kate Winslet.

Did you know? The Titanic had a sister ship, the Olympic. The ships were constructed around the same time, with the Olympic starting first. The Olympic was launched in 1910. She served as a cruise liner until pressed into service during WWI as a troop carrier. She was retired in 1935.

The film features Belfast residents who saw the ship launched in May 1911 and who were also there when she set sail on April 2nd, 1912 less than two weeks before she perished on her maiden voyage to America. The definitive story of the building of this magnificent ship.

The Almighty Dollar



The U.S. dollar is one of the strongest and most traded currencies on the planet, and its symbol \$ is instantly recognizable. It was invented by accident by Oliver Pollack on April 1, 1778. Pollack was an Irish merchant

living in New Orleans when the Revolutionary War began. War was expensive. As a British colony in revolt. America could not use British currency, so the Spanish peso became the preferred method of payment. Luckily for Pollack, he had built his fortune in Spanish pesos through illegal trading in the Spanish Caribbean. Pollock lent the Americans 300,000 Spanish pesos, equivalent to one billion of today's dollars, and kept detailed records of his transactions. In a ledger dated April 1, 1778, Pollack scribbled "ps," short for Spanish peso, in a way that looked like the dollar sign \$. In 1797, founding father Robert Morris adopted the strange symbol for America's new currency.

Fun & Random Facts About Easter

The Easter Bunny legend began in Germany. The origin of the Easter Bunny dates back hundreds of years, beginning in pre-Christian Germany. Here, the hare was said to be the symbol of the Pagan Goddess of Spring and Fertility.

Cadbury makes 500 million Crème Eggs every year! If you piled them on top of each other, it would be 10x higher than Mount Everest. The Birmingham factory produces 1.5 million Crème Eggs every day, and the Crème Egg is the most popular egg-shaped chocolate in the world.

The act of painting eggs originates from a Ukrainian tradition. For countless generations, Ukrainians have been decorating eggs as a calling out to the Gods and Goddesses of health and fertility. This traditional act of pysanka (pihsahn-kah) is made by using wax and dyes, but this colorful custom didn't take off until Ukrainian immigrants came to the U.S.

The world's largest Easter egg weighs in at 5000 lbs. and took 12,000 hours to complete. It is found in Vegreville, Alberta, Canada. Standing at 31 feet tall and 18 feet wide! Named the Vegreville Pysanka, the world's largest Easter egg is more of a jigsaw than a sculpture, as it is made from 3500 pieces of aluminum.

Ever wonder why Easter Sunday changes dates every year. It's down to the lunar calendar and the position of the moon. Easter in fact falls on the first Sunday after the full moon that takes places on or after March 21st, which is said to signal the start of spring.

Possibly the world's most expensive egg was sold at Christie's in London for 9 million pounds in 2007, breaking Faberge's record. The enameled egg contains a multi-colored cockerel which at ever hour pops out of the egg and flaps his wings, before nodding his head three times. The egg was made by Karl Faberge in St. Petersburg in 1902 and is the second largest egg ever made by Faberge.

CST – Critical Signal Technology

As shared last month, we are excited and proud to introduce CST - Critical Signal Technologies to Campus Commons. This is a multi-resident emergency response system. Each resident will be given (free of charge) a waterproof pendant. There are two styles to choose from: necklace or wristband. The pendants do not require charging. The battery life is 3-5 years and will send CST a low battery signal when it needs to be replaced.

How it works: A resident presses the pendant and if CST is unable to reach the resident, CST will assume they need emergency assistance and will dispatch EMS. The pendant program works with either a landline or a cellular phone.

By utilizing the most modern internet technology through the means of a network line, the pendants will replace the antiquated pull cords in each apartment. Once we are up and running with the pendant program, the pull cords will be removed from each apartment.

Our hope is that all residents will take advantage of this program. It is not mandatory, but it is strongly encouraged since there will no longer be pull cords in each apartment. Some residents have already inquired if they have their own pendant, can they continue to use it. The answer is yes! We will just make note to CST that you have another pendant source.
