Emerging from the pandemic

I am happy to report that all residents and staff received their second dose of the COVID vaccine in February and March. Residents can now move about the community, visit with their families — face to face, and resume life in a much more “normal” way than earlier in the year. It is wonderful to once more welcome new residents to the campus and see residents involved in a variety of social activities that provide a sense of enthusiasm and smiles to their faces.

Currently families may visit their loved ones at their leisure, in their rooms, if they wear masks. Children, age 16 years and younger, still cannot visit inside the community. Residents are spending time with their families outside the community without restriction. They may stay overnight or through weekends to catch up on the lives of their loved ones.

Once again, our buses are offering weekly shopping trips, scenic drives, and medical appointment trips to residents. The entire mood of the campus is changing. People are visiting, enjoying conversations with one another, and feeling optimistic about the future and what it may hold.

All residents and staff are still wearing masks. Our doors are not open to the public. We are still not hosting some of the special events that have been hosted in the past: community picnic and Comedy works trip. In November, ESMRC may begin to host some in-house fraternal meetings to re-engage Masonic members with their lodges and chapters.

Plans are to host the annual Family and Resident Christmas Party in December.

The support of families, friends and fraternal members has been outstanding during this tough time. The donations and financial support by everyone has been tremendous. The words of encouragement that I and many of the staff have received has kept the residents and staff going throughout these difficult months when ESMRC

was entirely shut down and totally isolated.

I can't thank enough the ESMRC staff for their ongoing commitment, hard work, and quality of care they continued to provide during this time to keep residents safe, and well cared for. Their dedication to this community is what makes it special and sets it apart from our competitors.



We are looking forward to returning to “normal” operations by the end of the year. That will certainly depend upon Colorado stopping the spread of the virus. The goal is that by January 2022, ESMRC will have the community fully open for business with lots of community enthusiasm, new residents, and fun activities.

Please continue to watch for and read the weekly email updates to follow what is happening at ESMRC. Other sources of information include weekly postings on Facebook. My staff and I will do our best to keep you in the communication loop, as things change in the Executive Orders, operating guidelines, and regulation mandates from the city and state health departments as they change. I encourage all families, friends, and Masonic members to stay involved with ESMRC. Consider volunteering on the campus. Your ongoing support is paramount to our community being a success now and in the future. I appreciate your support and hope you will come by soon to pay us a visit.

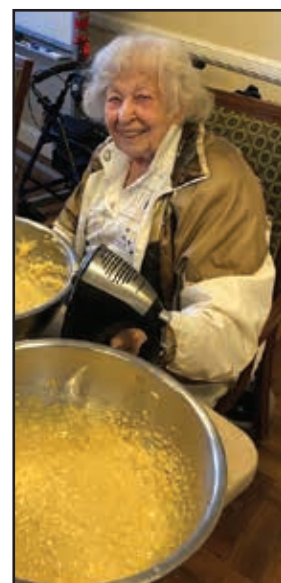

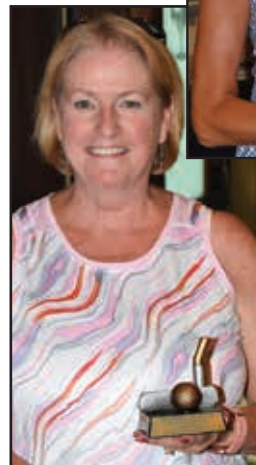
Left: Elsie celebrated turning 104 years young on Aug. 13 with friends and family. She is a 60-year-plus member of the Order of Eastern Star from New York.

ing 158, supported the cause. Major sponsors were Pickard Construction and Benchmark Investments. More than

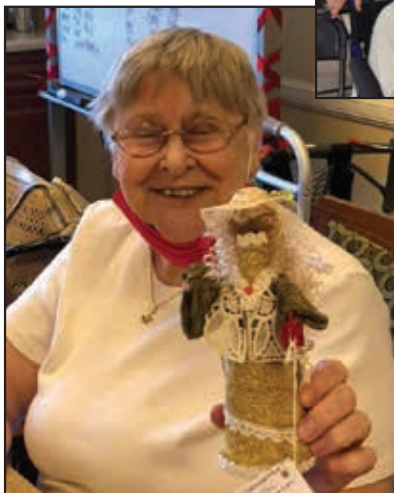

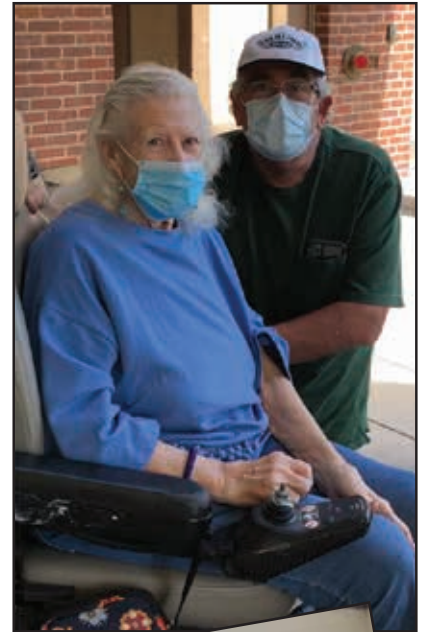
ESMRC held its annual 4th of July BBQ for residents and families. A delicious time was had by all who attended.

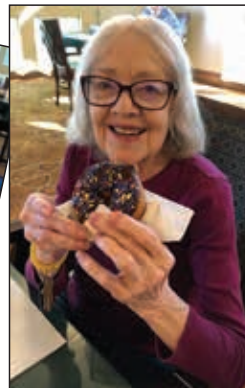
