Talking Turkey About Thanksgiving!

Let's dive into some interesting facts about Thanksgiving that you might NOT know!

Colonists and Native Americans may not have had turkey at their feast.

While most of us enjoy turkey as the centerpiece of our table, no one can say for sure whether it was even on the menu back in 1621. However, the original guests did indulge in other foods like lobster, seal and swan. The Wampanoag also reportedly brought five deer to the celebration. If you also enjoy venison at your table, consider yourselves perfectly aligned with a longstanding tradition.

The woman behind "Mary Had a Little Lamb" is also responsible for Thanksgiving's recognition as a national holiday.

Writer and Editor Sarah Josepha Hale convinced President Abraham Lincoln to officially declare Thanksgiving a national holiday, after three decades of persistent lobbying. The author also founded the *American Ladies Magazine*, which promoted women's issues long before suffrage. She wrote countless articles and letters, advocating for Thanksgiving to help unify the Northern and Southern states amid gathering divisions. Hale kept at it, even after the Civil War broke out, and Lincoln actually wrote the proclamation just a week after her last letter in 1863, earning her the name the Mother of Thanksgiving.

World War I officially ended on June 28, 1919, with the signing of the Treaty of Versailles. The actual fighting between the Allies and Germany, however, had ended seven months earlier with the armistice, which went into effect on the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month in 1918. Armistice Day, As November 11 became known, officially became a holiday in the United States in 1926, and a national holiday 12 years later. On June 1, 1954, the name was changed to Veterans Day to honor all U.S. Veterans.

In 1968, the Uniform Holidays Bill was passed by Congress, which moved the celebration of Veterans Day to the fourth Monday in October. The law went into effect in 1971, but in 1975, President Gerald Ford returned Veterans Day to November 11th, due to the important historical significance of the date.

Official national ceremonies for Veterans Day center around the Tomb of the Unknowns. To honor these men, symbolic of all Americans who gave their lives in all wars, an Army honor guard, the 3d U.S. Infantry (The Old Guard), keeps day and night vigil. At 11 a.m. on November 11, a combined color guard representing all military services executes "Present Arms" at the tomb. The nation's tribute to its war dead is symbolized by the laying of a presidential wreath and the playing of "Taps".


The men and women who served and protect the U.S. come from all walks of life; they are parents, children, grandparents, friends, neighbors and coworkers, and are an important part of their communities.

On November 10th, the Marine Corp turns 245 years old. On November 10, 1775, the Continental Congress adopted a resolution to create a Marine force composed of two battalions to serve as landing forces with the Continental Navy during the American Revolutionary War (1775-1783). Since then, the Marines have been "from the halls of Montezuma to the shores of Tripoli" and many other places as well. The United States Marine Corps is the US Armed Forces' combined-arms task force on land, at sea and in the air. It has more than 280,000 active duty personnel as well as almost 40,000 personnel in the Marine Corp Reserve.

This day is mainly celebrated by personnel, veterans or other people related to the Marine Corps. Usually, it is marked with a Marine Corps Birthday Ball with a formal dinner, birthday cake and entertainment. The first Marine Corp Ball was held in 1925.



Election Day is November 2nd. Election Day refers to the day on which general elections in the United States are held. Presidential elections are held every 4 years and the elected president will then be sworn in to take office on the following January 20th, a day known as Inauguration Day.

Election Day in the United States is always on the Tuesday after the first Monday in November. Elections held for federal offices only occur on even-numbered years.

Go out and exercise your right to vote on November 2nd! To quote Franklin D. Roosevelt:

"Nobody will ever deprive the American people of the right to vote except the American people themselves and the only way they could do this is by not voting."



The History of Square Dancing Day

Square Dancing has its roots in traditional English, Irish and Scottish folk dance. Square dances were first documented in 17th-century England. They came to North America right along with the European settlers, where they were modified and improved over the years. The Western American square dance is perhaps the most famous type of square dance worldwide; in fact, the square dance is the official dance of 19 American states.

Square dancing is mainly associated with a romanticized image of the Old West and cowboys wooing Southern belles during dances organized at saloons to celebrate various occasions. The dance is accompanied by jolly, lively music on guitars, fiddles, accordions and bagpipes.

The dances normally form patterns of lines, circles and, as the name suggests, squares, with couples taking a turn in every role. In most American forms of square dance, the dancers are prompted through the square dance choreography of the beat of the music.

Sometimes, this so-called "caller" is one of the dancers, but more commonly the "caller" is found on the stage with the band. Interest in square dancing which had waned during the World Wars, experienced a revival in New York City, in the 1950s, during the American folk music revival.

Square Dancing Day exists to celebrate the square dance form of folk dancing, and is a great way to get out and "Dosey Do". This fun, healthy and simple form of dance with a long history definitely deserves a holiday all of its own, and it has one.
