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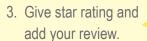
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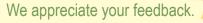

Residents of the Month: Ruth and Byron P.

I was born Ruth Justice in Brookings, South Dakota November 25, 1925. I had a twin sister (Ruby), another sister (Arla) and a brother (Gene). Growing up I spent considerable time with my grandmother, who lived in nearby Aurora, learning how to cook, garden and sew. I had a wonderful childhood, but many of the details are now lost in my memory.

I was born Byron Parfrey in Richland Center, Wisconsin August 27, 1928, to William and Violet Parfrey. My dad worked for the Carnation (condensed milk) Company in Richland Center. I had two sisters (Bettie and Beverly).

I (Byron) went to Richland Center High School where I was active in sports, including baseball, boxing, and basketball. After graduation in 1946 I worked at the Carnation Company in Richland Center and Oscar Mayer in Madison until I was drafted into the Army in 1950. After training at Fort Polk in Louisiana, I was sent overseas to fight in the Korean War as part of the First Calvary Division.

I was the best shot in my outfit and became well respected by my unit for accuracy. I once shot into the turret of a Chinese T-34 tank with my M-1 rifle and set the tank on fire. I also had an amazing sense of when danger was close by and was made squad leader early in my deployment. Often our squad would pray over dead enemy soldiers, which led to our nickname of "The Sunday School Squad". We served in what was referred to as the "Iron Triangle", where the enemy Chinese soldiers dramatically outnumbers the Allied troops. I was honored to serve with soldiers from many countries and nearly all the states in America.

Unfortunately, I was severely wounded by a buried landmine that blew up our armored vehicle and later by an artillery shell that sent shrapnel into my head and upper body. These injuries led to extended treatment and recovery in the Army Hospital in Kellogg Michigan, and my honorable discharge in January 1953.

After my discharge, I enrolled in Madison Business School and soon was employed by the State of Wisconsin in the Division of Public Health. In this role I traveled the state advising and troubleshooting for the various public health providers to improve their services to Wisconsin's citizens. I was good at my job and retired after nearly 34 years of service in 1992.

I enjoyed hunting and traveled to South Dakota in 1955 to hunt pheasants. While buying supplies in the Town of Brookings one day, I was assisted by a clerk named Ruth. I was quite taken by her and began writing to her when I returned to my home in Wisconsin. Five years later, Ruth and I were married, and we recently celebrated our 61st wedding anniversary.

I (Ruth) have to say that I am glad Byron stopped by our store that day in 1955. We have enjoyed a wonderful life together. Because of Byron's work, I was able to stay at home most of my life. My most notable job was serving as a nanny for the family of Wisconsin Governor Lee Sherman Dreyfus. Other than that, I enjoyed cooking, gardening, and caring for our home of 61 years on Vahlen Street in Madison, very near Maple Bluff.

Mostly we enjoyed our many travel experiences together. One of our favorite destinations was Alaska, which we visited three times. We have so many stories about our travels. I think we have seen every wild animal in this country (including Kodiak Bears in Denali National Park) and we have even witnessed UFOs up close and personal. Ask us about the time the UFO stripped the meat out of a small herd of cattle, leaving only the carcass, but no blood!



Byron and I were never able to have our own children, but we remained very close to our parents, brothers, nephews, and nieces throughout our lives. Our religion (Baptist) has been a very important part of our lives.

We are pleased to live at Ingleside Communities, where we moved after selling our home in 2020. The wonderful staff here provides us with the assistance we now need. We are still able to be together most of the time and we appreciate our blessings.

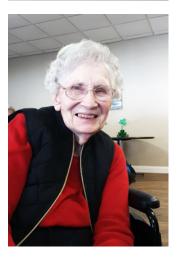




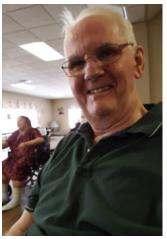

Haiku Fun!

What is a haiku (hahy-koo)? A haiku is traditionally a non-rhyming three-line poem of Japanese origin that offers a way of looking at the physical world. The origins of haiku can be traced back to the ninth century.

The haiku consists of three lines with a five-seven-five syllable structure using sensory language to gain inspiration. Matsuo Basho (1644-1694) is considered the greatest haiku poet of all time.

Here is simple Easterthemed haiku:

Easter Bunny Hops Flower Eggs Jelly Beans Fun Hidden Baskets Full

Clapping out each word's syllables makes them easier to count when creating your poem.

Haikus can be a fun and fast alternative to writing a longer poem. Try your hand a writing a haiku today and share with family and friends.
