A Certified Nursing Assistant (CNA) is an essential part of a healthcare team, providing care and assistance to patients & senior residents, and helping them stay safe and comfortable so they can enjoy the highest quality of life.

In Wisconsin, prospective CNAs must pass a class and take a state test to become certified. Each state has specific education and testing requirements.

DUTIES OF A CNA

- Take & record vital signs
- Answer patient call lights and handle requests
- Assist with ambulation, turning, repositioning
- Communicate patient information with team members
- Observe patients and reporting to nurses
- Document patient status & information
- Help with activities and outings
- Keep patient rooms clean
- Assist nursing staff with medical procedures
- Assist with ADLs (activities of daily living): bathing, hygiene, dressing, eating, toileting, etc.
- Know emergency procedures and safety policies
