

DIFFERENCE BETWEEN ASSISTED LIVING & SKILLED NURSING FACILITIES



There are so many options in senior care today, it can be difficult for many families to understand the differences and choose the senior living community that best fits both their loved ones' needs and their own. **Below is a comparison chart that helps you discover a few differences between assisted living and nursing home care (skilled nursing).**

	ASSISTED LIVING	NURSING HOME <i>(Skilled Nursing Facility)</i>
WHAT IS IT?	Assisted Living offers a combination of homelike housing community, personalized support services and health care that responds to the needs of those who require help with activities of daily life.	Nursing Homes or Skilled Nursing Facilities offer skilled medical care for adults that need higher levels of complex care or have chronically ill conditions.
HOW MUCH CARE DO YOU RECEIVE?	In assisted living, residents may need some help with transportation, medication management, housekeeping, and other specific activities of daily living such as dressing and personal care services, but still live pretty independent lives.	Residents in a nursing home require around-the-clock care and monitoring. They typically live with more complex health care conditions that require the assistance of a skilled nurse or a physical or speech therapist. Some require respiratory care services.
WHAT DOES IS COST?	Assisted living rents average across our organization at \$3,365 per month. Apartments range from one bedroom to one bedroom plus dens, two bedrooms and more. Residents and their families generally pay the cost of care from their own assets and resources. Some costs may be reimbursable through long-term care policies.	The average monthly cost of nursing homes in the U.S. in 2021 is about \$7,908/month for a semi-private room and \$9,034/month for a private room, according to Genworth. Typically, these rooms are studio style or shared. The resident's and their family's resources or Medicaid pay for nursing home care. Some costs may be reimbursable through long-term care policies.
WHAT IS THE LIVING ENVIRONMENT LIKE?	Assisted living communities are designed to feel homelike and residents live in their own apartments with private bathrooms and kitchens.	Nursing homes have more of a clinical environment and residents typically live in a private or semiprivate room that does not include a living room or kitchen.
