## **Chaplains Corner**

Joy to the World, the Lord is come! It is a well-loved hymn, but have you ever dug deeper into who wrote it?

This is the first line of a well-known hymn that many will sing this month. We may hear well-known artists sing this hymn on the radio as some radio stations changed to Christmas music up until the 25th of December. We may sing it in our churches at least once in the month of December. The first word that will come out of our mouths will be, Joy!

Of course, the Gospel, the good news, will have us focused on the birth of Jesus and what a treasure that is to hear from the Gospels again. The last words of the hymn bring the good news in full circle,

"And wonders of his love."

I believe that the joy that comes into the world will make us wonder and watch for how Jesus' love in the world takes shape in us and all around us. It truly is a joy.

The hymn is actually a poem by Isaac Watts. Surprisingly, this hymn was not written for Christmas. Rather, Isaac Watts wrote the hymn as a paraphrase of the last five verses in Psalm 98 for his 1719 publication, The Psalms of David

Imitated. In this hymnal, Watts rewrites many of the psalms using a Christological lens. His versification of Psalm 98 is no different. Verse nine of the psalm reads, "...let them sing before the LORD, for he comes to judge the earth. He will judge the world in righteousness and the peoples with equity.

"Watts unapologetically interprets this as a reference to Christ.

I would encourage you to read Psalm 98 and the verses from the hymn, "Joy to the World," and get a sense of how the psalm inspired Watts.

The tune of the hymn is also iconic. The tune's name is, "Antioch," and is attributed to Lowell Mason who many say that he is the arranger of the music. Others say that some of the note clusters are either the same or similar to that of George Fredric Handel's classical piece, "Messiah"

All in all, this classic hymn is music to many ears and hearts this time of year and when we look back to the writer of the hymn, we take time to ponder the generations upon generations in which the awe and wonder of the birth of the Messiah has brought to this world.

My hope is that when you sing this hymn in December that you sing out as loud as you can and marvel at the love that God has given us through Jesus.

May the world be truly blessed and awake to the joy that Jesus gives. Blessed Advent and Merry Christmas! Joy to the world indeed!
