WHEELCHAIR, USE OF

PURPOSE:

- 1. To provide mobility for the non-ambulatory resident with safety and comfort.
- 2. To provide mobility for residents learning to become independent in activities of daily living.

EQUIPMENT:

- 1. Wheelchair.
- 2. Protective seat cushion, if necessary.
- 3. Pressure-reducing seat cushion, if necessary.

PROCEDURE:

- 1. **NOTE:** WHEELCHAIR SHOULD BE THE PROPER SIZE; IF TOO LARGE, THE RESIDENT WILL NOT BE ABLE TO MAINTAIN GOOD BODY ALIGNMENT. IF TOO SMALL, SKIN IRRITATION WILL RESULT DUE TO PRESSURE.
- 2. APPLY BRAKES TO LOCK WHEELS OF WHEELCHAIR.
- 3. Fold foot rests up out of the resident's way for safety. DO NOT REMOVE FOOT RESTS UNLESS RESIDENT USES FEET ON FLOOR TO ENABLE MOBILITY.
- 4. Pad seat of chair with pressure-reducing cushion and light cover if necessary. Do not sit resident directly onto plastic or foam cushion.
- 5. Assist resident to dress in appropriate clothing with proper footwear as per plan of care.
- 6. Assist resident into wheelchair, using proper transfer techniques.
- 7. Lower foot rests and place resident's feet on foot rests if used. Position feet and legs in good body alignment. Be sure residents feet are securely positioned on foot rest/use calf supports and adaptive equipment as needed (foot board/foot boxes). Elevate leg(s) as ordered.
- 8. Check to be sure clothing or protective cover is not wrinkled under the resident.
- 9. Be sure the resident's clothing covers his/her back so that his/her skin is not in contact with the plastic back rest.
- 10. Permit the resident to remain in the wheelchair according to the physician's order or as tolerated.
- 11. Assist resident to bathroom and re-position at least every two hours.
- 12. Assist resident to the area of the facility desired. Encourage and instruct resident in proper procedures for safely propelling the wheelchair.
- 13. When returning resident to room, assist with transfer to bed, recliner chair, etc. as necessary per plan of care.
- 14. Leave resident in comfortable position with call light within reach.

PROPELLING WHEELCHAIR BACKWARD:

Wheelchairs are to be propelled forward unless it is unsafe to do so. For safety, wheelchairs are propelled backward over elevations, door thresholds and rough surfaces.
