Eat Like You're Irish

Add authentic flair to your St. Patrick's Day celebrations by indulging in some traditional Irish foods.

Corned beef and cabbage. It's the dish everyone in North America associates with St. Patrick's Day, but it's really an American version of the bacon and cabbage eaten by Emerald Isle residents. When Irish immigrants arrived in the U.S., they found corned beef brisket to be less expensive and more available than bacon, so they incorporated it into their home cooking.

Soda bread. The key ingredients of baking soda and buttermilk give this rustic, round loaf its distinctive flavor and texture. According to Irish legend, an "X" is cut into the loaf's top to let fairies out while the bread is baking.

Colcannon. Potatoes are present at nearly every Irish meal, sometimes in two different forms. This dish—mashed potatoes mixed with kale or cabbage, scallions, and butter or cream—is a delicious addition to any St. Patrick's Day plate.

Irish stew. Often considered Ireland's national dish, this hearty stew was traditionally made with mutton. Nowadays, lamb is more likely to accompany the flavorful mix of potatoes, onions and carrots.

Symbols of Luck

Since the beginning of civilization, people have used various symbols to bring them good luck.

Four-leaf clover. Irish legend claims this green plant will bring luck—if a person can spot the rarity. Scientists say the odds of finding a four-leaf clover in the wild are 1 in 10,000.

Ladybug. These insects, recognized by their bright red bodies with black spots, are beneficial to farmers and gardeners because they feast on plant-eating pests, which may be why many cultures admire "lucky ladybugs."

Horseshoe. Ancient folklore was full of mischievous fairies who were afraid of metal, so people hung iron horseshoes above their doors to keep them away. Some believe that hanging a horseshoe with the ends pointed up collects good fortune; others say that pointing the ends down allows luck to flow onto those below it.

Penny. You've probably heard the saying, "Find a penny, pick it up, and all day long you'll have good luck." The coin is said to be lucky only if found face side up.

Rainbow. Legend has it that a pot of gold can be found at the end of a rainbow, explaining why the colorful sight is a sign of good fortune.
